CITY MANAGER:

A second reading of the ordinance that places a ½ cent sales tax measure on the June 7th ballot was approved at the February 23rd City Council meeting. This was the last action the City Council must take to place the item on the ballot.

The application period for the Building Official closed on February 18, 2016. Interviews will be held on March 2nd and 3rd.

Roy Seiler, CPA, and I met yesterday to discuss the mid-year budget. Declining sales tax revenue continue to be a large concern for the City. The Mid-Year Budget Update will be given at the March 8th City Council meeting.

Bob Crane, Lucero Olive Oil, agreed to the terms for the City's use of logos created by Lucero Olive Oil. The City Council will consider the agreement at a future City Council meeting in March.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT:

City Pool:

There are 10 Lifeguards who operate and maintain the City Pool during the swim season. Public Works has invited all 10 guards to return for the upcoming season and 9 have responded favorably. Beginning March 1st, the Public Works Department will advertise to fill one Lifeguard position.

City Pool Fees:

During the February 23rd City Council Meeting, Council requested clarification of the Family Pass. After speaking to City Pool Manager Nathaniel Borer, City Pool Policy is that the Family Pass is for immediate family members only and there is an 8 person limit.

Community Event:

Dignity Health representative Amy Gonczerek has contacted the Public Works Department with a request to host its 2nd Annual Color Dash on Saturday, March 5th. The event will be held at CUHS and will encompass four city streets surrounding the high school; Blackburn Avenue, First Street, North Street and Marguerite Avenue. They intend to host the event just as they did last year, utilizing half of each streets width for the runners/walkers and using the assistance of volunteers to provide traffic control. Proceeds from the event will benefit the afterschool programs supported by CUHS. Applications to participate in the event are located in the office at the high school.

POLICE DEPARTMENT:

Patrol:

In addition to responding to 185 calls for service, a total of 30 officer reports were taken and there were 96 officer-initiated incidents, including 52 traffic stops. Officers made 13 misdemeanor arrests and 3 felony arrests, and issued 28 citations of which 14 were misdemeanors, 8 were infractions, 4 were animal-related and 2 were parking-related during the period of February 17, 2016 through February 24, 2016.
